## Research

The APhA Foundation is focused on helping patients optimize medication use by coordinating with pharmacists. Through innovative research that explores new models of pharmacy practice, the APhA Foundation is shaping the landscape of pharmacy and patient care. The role of the pharmacist is changing, and the APhA Foundation is seeking opportunities to ease the stress on patients and the health care system. The APhA Foundation is proud to conduct research and programming which brings credibility to new practice-based care models representing the future of the pharmacy profession.

## Project IMPACT™: Diabetes



The APhA Foundation's Project IMPACT: Diabetes brings pharmacist-provided disease and medication management to 25 communities across the US that are disproportionately affected by diabetes. This includes:

- Patients in geographic areas with a high incidence of diabetes
- · Patients with unhealthy hemoglobin A1C and other health indicators
- Patients with limited access to quality diabetes care
- Communities with socioeconomic challenges and factors that impact patient access to care

In 2011 the APhA Foundation launched Project IMPACT<sup>TM</sup>: Diabetes. The Foundation hosted informational webinars about the project and sent out a request for proposals. Twenty-five communities in 17 states were selected as community sites to partner with the APhA Foundation. Partnering sites include: community pharmacies, federally qualified health centers, employer groups, community-based organizations, and insurers to facilitate the integration of pharmacists into clinical teams. Sites are in both urban and rural settings, and help patients of varying demographic backgrounds.

The APhA Foundation's proven practice model from past research is tailored within each of the 25 communities and administered to meet the local needs of patients. Through Project IMPACT: Diabetes, the APhA Foundation provides communities with tools and resources to facilitate local success among their diabetes patients.

These implementation resources include:

- · Web-based tool kit that includes patient education information and provider process development tools
- Patient Self-Management Credential
- Project IMPACT: Diabetes Database to facilitate the collection of minimum and maximum data sets

# Project IMPACT™: Diabetes (continued)

The APhA Foundation also provides guidance and support by connecting each community to one of three Community Coordinators who serve as mentors. The Community Coordinator visits assigned communities and interviews various stakeholders including patients, pharmacists, health care providers, and payers. These interviews serve to tell the story of the community and its delivery of care prior to implementing Project IMPACT: Diabetes. Future visits and interviews will capture each community's story afterwards to demonstrate the impact that the project has had on the community.

During the first year of Project IMPACT: Diabetes, communities are focused on engaging patients in the project. The APhA Foundation has more than 2,000 patients recieving diabetes care through this project to date. ## Pharmacists and MTM in Collaboration

The APhA Foundation partnered with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's Division of Heart Disease and Stroke Prevention on a project focused on identifying key elements of policy that would empower pharmacists to enter into collaborative practice agreements and provide MTM to patients. The planning phase of this project took place in the fourth quarter of 2011 in anticipation of a consortium meeting held in January 2012. A white paper with these key elements and four translational tools to help spread the elements will be published in 2012.



# Project ImPACT™: Hypertension

Project ImPACT: Hypertension, supported by Daiichi Sankyo and Forest Laboratories, took shape in 2011, as University Pharmacy in Detroit, Michigan, received Investigational Review Board approval to begin enrolling patients. Maria Young, owner and pharmacist at University Pharmacy, held screening events for nearby Wayne State University employees and enrolled over 150 patients by November 2011. Each of these patients received a pedometer and blood pressure monitor that can wirelessly transmit data to the pharmacy computer. This data helps the pharmacy team provide MTM and targeted consultation to patients about their day-to-day activity and at-home blood pressure readings. The six-month patient care period closes in May of 2012 and results will be published later in the year.

# People's Pharmacy School

The People's Pharmacy School, supported by Schering Plough Foundation, is a program developed by the APhA Foundation to improve understanding of the pharmacist's role in answering medicine-related questions, including what a medicine is, ways to save money, and importance of taking medicine. Pharmacists and student pharmacists are encouraged to integrate this presentation in their community outreach. The presentation slides are available as a <u>free download</u>.

# **COPD** White Paper

In March 2011, the APhA Foundation published the *White Paper on Expanding the Role of Pharmacists in Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease (COPD*). This paper includes ideas produced during a roundtable discussion hosted by the APhA Foundation focused on the pharmacist's role in detection, assessment, treatment and management of patients with COPD.

Three key roles of the pharmacist that were examined are:

- 1. Improving adherence and compliance to medication regimens;
- 2. Incorporating pharmacists into support groups, education programs, and smoking cessation programs; and
- 3. Providing medication regimen reviews.

# **Incentive Grant Program**



Inaugurated in 1993, the Incentive Grant Program is the APhA Foundation's longest-running program. Grants totaling more than \$200,000 have facilitated the development of over 200 pharmacy-based projects, improving the health outcomes of thousands of patients across the country.

Incentive grants offer pharmacists seed money to implement or support an existing patient care service within their pharmacy practice. The program originally started with 20 grants, and has now more than doubled in the number of grants available. Awarding an incentive grant encourages practitioners and student pharmacists through APhA-Academy of Student Pharmacist chapters to foster new ideas and allows them to "lead by example" and serve as a starting point for developing innovative patient care services.

The residency program aims to train pharmacy college graduates for leadership positions within the profession and other health-related organizations and in the many aspects of association management.

# **APhA Foundation Pinnacle Awards**



The Pinnacle Awards, established in 1998, celebrate significant contributions to the medication use process through increasing patient adherence, reducing drug misadventures, promoting the use of national treatment guidelines, improving patient outcomes, or enhancing communication among the members of the health care team. ## The categories of awards are:

- Individual Award for Career Achievement: Nominees in this category are individuals that have demonstrated exceptional leadership in enhancing health care quality and medication use.
- Group Practices, Health Systems, and Health Care Corporations: This category recognizes a significant scientific contribution and/or quality improvement project in one of these settings.
- Voluntary Health Agencies, Nonprofit Organizations, Associations, Government Agencies and Public/ Private Partnerships: Special emphasis in this category is placed on submissions that assist patients and their caregivers in achieving better outcomes from their medications.

## 2011 Pinnacle Award Recipients



#### **Individual Award for Career Achievement**

Melvin Baron, PharmD, MPA, FAPhA, FACA, FCPhA Associate Professor at the University of Southern California School of Pharmacy

Baron is tireless when it comes to helping people get the information and services they need to optimize health. He has been a strong advocate for the profession of pharmacy for over 50 years, illustrating the pharmacist's abilities to improve patient outcomes, educate the public and save health care dollars. His efforts helped launch the USC School of Pharmacy's model practice in a dozen safety-net clinics in the Los Angeles area.

Recognizing the need for materials that target the Latino population, Baron helped launch a booming health literacy project using fotonovelas, comic book style stories, to impart vital health information in an engaging communication vehicle that is culturally sensitive and behaviorally impactful. These fotonovelas take on some of today's most challenging health issues such as diabetes, dementia and medication compliance by dispelling myths and misconceptions that frequently stymie patient outcomes.



#### Group Practice/Health System/Corporation Award

The Medication Assistance Program (MAP) at The Ohio State University Medical Center (OSUMC) and Arthur G. James Cancer Center Hospital and Richard J. Solove Research Institute

The OSUMC MAP offers a unique service to patients to help them obtain necessary medications through pharmaceutical manufacturer patient assistance programs, disease-based assistance grants, charity care dollars and other funding sources. The OSUMC MAP serves patients at all OSUMC Hospitals, 13 outpatient clinics and two emergency departments, and utilizes a staff of two pharmacists, two pharmacy interns and seven program coordinators. The program functions primarily as a referral service for health

care professionals, social workers and financial counselors as they become aware that a patient has limited ability to pay for necessary medications. Since its inception in 2001, the Medication Assistance Program has formally assisted more than 8,700 patients, processed more than 22,000 applications and obtained more than \$53 million worth of medications for either take home or replacement purposes.

#### Government Agency/Nonprofit Organization/Association Award

Patient Safety and Clinical Pharmacy Services Collaborative (PSPC)

The PSPC is a national breakthrough effort to improve the quality of health care across America by integrating patient-centered clinical pharmacy services into the care and management of high-risk, high-cost, medically complex patients. This Collaborative is a vehicle for strengthening the patient-centered health home, systematically addressing medication management risk and safety in the ambulatory care setting. By focusing on integrating patient-centered medication management delivered by an interdisciplinary care team to help improve health outcomes and patient safety, the Collaborative helps

reconcile a fragmented health care delivery system with the growing demand to address medication management through a health home model. In 12 months under PSPC, 54% of the selected patients improved to medically under control, adverse drug events were reduced by 49%, and potential adverse drug events were reduced by 60%.

PSPC is a component of the Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) Healthcare Systems Bureau, Office of Pharmacy Affairs (OPA). In all of its activities, OPA emphasizes the importance of comprehensive pharmacy services as an integral part of primary health care.

# Jacob W. Miller Award

The Jacob W. Miller award was established in 2000 to honor the extraordinary service of Jacob W. Miller. Miller served as the APhA Foundation's president from 1991 to 2000. This award recognizes an individual who has advanced the mission of the APhA Foundation by demonstrating active involvement in the Foundation's programs, exemplary support in establishing and/or maintaining APhA Foundation initiatives, or outstanding leadership in carrying out the mission of the APhA Foundation. The award recipient is selected by the APhA Foundation Board of Directors.

The **2011** Jacob W. Miller Award was presented to Marie E. Michnich, DrPH, in recognition of her significant contributions to improving people's health as a national health policy strategist and through her work as an active member of the APhA Foundation.

Dr. Michnich served for 14 years as an Associate and then Senior Associate Executive Vice President for both the Health Policy and the Clinical Practice and

Scientific Services Divisions of the American College of Cardiology. Currently, she serves as the Director of Health Policy Educational Programs and Fellowships for the Institute of Medicine (IOM) at the National Academy of Sciences.

Dr. Michnich also served as the very first public member of the Foundation with six years of service concluding in March 2008. Prior to that time she helped with the establishment of the Pinnacle Awards when she served as Chair of the Health Care Quality Alliance, a national coalition of 100 organizations that joined to preserve quality of health care in the United States. The Alliance served as co-sponsor for the first two years of the awards.



# APhA Foundation – Library and Archives

The Joseph D. Williams library supports the missions and collaborative initiatives of the APhA Foundation and the American Pharmacists Association through research and grant seeking opportunities. The library collection contains nearly 15,000 books, journals, reports, guidelines and other media. It has become an important part of the APhA headquarters building tour as it provides access to unique and historical information for pharmacists and their families.

## Volunteer Extraordinaire!

The APhA Archives are located in the library and serve as a historical recognition to APhA and the pharmacy profession. The Archives are administered by George B. Griffenhagen, a former APhA staff member, and now an historian for APhA. He has worked on a number of projects collecting, restoring, and documenting an impressive collective pharmacy history. Most recently, Griffenhagen has worked on an extensive photograph collection. He has alphabetically organized the photos and documented individuals and their significance to the pharmacy community,

when known. To date, there are 30,000 photographs of over 6,000 pharmacy leaders, pharmacists, or speakers. When completed, the Archives will have one of the most widespread photograph collections of pharmacy leaders and pharmacists throughout history.

Griffenhagen also completed an APhA Convention Badge collection. He gathered badges worn by meeting registrants from 1880 through 1939 and restored them by hand. Each badge was then placed in an individual labeled envelope as well as scanned to create an electronic file. An APhA Convention Badge poster, which includes a collage of collected badges, is prominently displayed at headquarters. A booklet showcasing each badge and identifying historical information has also been created, and can be viewed online.

The Archives create an impressive historical documentation for the Association and the pharmacy profession. The APhA Foundation is proud to support these activities.
